## **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Nuclear Weapons Abo-
- 5 lition and Conversion Act of 2023".

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1	SEC. 2. UNITED STATES ABOLITION OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS
2	AND CONVERSION OF RESOURCES TO EN-
3	ERGY AND ECONOMIC PURPOSES.
4	(a) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Con-
5	gress that the United States should provide leadership
6	by—
7	(1) signing the Treaty on the Prohibition of
8	Nuclear Weapons; and
9	(2) ratifying such treaty when it is clear that
10	ratification will result in—
11	(A) the dismantlement and elimination of
12	all nuclear weapons in every country; and
13	(B) strict and effective international con-
14	trol of such dismantlement and elimination.
15	(b) REDIRECTION OF RESOURCES.—Beginning on
16	the date on which the President certifies to Congress that
17	all countries possessing nuclear weapons have begun the
18	verifiable and irreversible elimination of such weapons
19	under the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons,
20	the United States shall redirect resources that are being
21	used for nuclear weapons programs to be used for—
22	(1) purposes related to addressing the climate
23	crisis, including through the development and de-
24	ployment of clean, renewable energy sources, by con-
25	verting all nuclear weapons industry processes,

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1	plants, and programs for such purposes and by re-
2	training nuclear industry employees; and
3	(2) addressing human and infrastructure needs,
4	such as health care, housing, education, agriculture,
5	and environmental restoration, including long-term
6	radioactive waste monitoring; and
7	(3) actively promote policies to induce all other
8	countries to join in the commitments referred to in
9	paragraphs $(1)$ and $(2)$ to create a more peaceful
10	and secure world.
